Music Business of the United States.

Few individuals are aware of the extent of the business more or less directly connected with music, and which is increasing at the rate of one hundred per cent. per annum. Where thousands of dollars were invested thirty years ago, millions are now employed.

The capital invested in the manufacture of pianofortes alone in the United States is fully equal to that employed in the manufacture of cotton goods. Many of these pianoforte manufactories in New York, Boston, Albany, Philadelphia and Baltimore, employ each from one to four hundred mechanics. In each of the principal melodeon manufactories from one to three hundred men are employed. A large number of workmen are constantly engaged making brass and other musical instruments. The building of organs is a great business; and music publishing involves an immense capital. Of such magnitude and importance had this last branch become that, in 1856, the parties engaged in it found it necessary to form a

BOARD OF MUSIC TRADE.

This Board grew out of a peculiar necessity of the trade—that of having a uniform plan of doing the details of the business.

The amount of detail in the publication and selling of music is probably greater than that of any other trade of equal amount; and as there is an apparent necessity that each publisher should be able to supply the works of every other publisher, and as the number of pieces published is so great and the separate value of each piece so small, a uniformity in the plan of doing the business, the manner of marking prices, discounts to the trade and profession, etc., is of decided advantage. This necessity was long felt, and various plans were proposed before the present one was adopted.

There is probably no instance in the annals of trade where the honesty and integrity of purpose of so many who are necessarily competitors, and who are so far removed from each other, have so well stood the test of time and circumstance. It is not only a matter of honor and dignity of character, but one of pecuniary interest for every member to be faithful himself and to see that others are so.

Every regulation of the Trade is liberal, and seeks first to protect the interest of dealers and teachers.

The bane of the trade is the accumulation of stock on the shelves, and in order to correct this the rates of discount, which in other trades might appear large, are paying rates only under close and careful management.

The necessities in the United States for this uniform system have been greater than in Europe, because there all the popular works were copyrighted, which right of itself destroyed competition; whereas most of the American publications, until within a very few years, were reprints of European ones and open for publication, thus reducing the business by a ruinous competition, and excluding from publication the works of American authors.

Mr. George P. Reed, of Boston, was the first president. He was succeeded by Mr. Oliver Ditson, who filled the chair with great ability for two years. He was in turn succeeded by Mr. Willig, the *nestor* of the trade, who also served two years to the fullest satisfaction of all. At the last meeting held in August, 1860, Mr. James F. Hall, of the firm of Wm. Hall & Son, New York, was elected president.

Any music publisher may be elected a member by a two-thirds vote of the Board, provided he is the owner of at least *one thousand* engraved plates not published by any other member of the Board, but is required to pay an initiation fee of \$25, and sign the articles of association.

The prosperity of the sheet-music publishing business in the United States of the houses constituting the Board of Music Trade alone, may be judged from its having nearly doubled itself every year during the last five years.

The *fifth* annual meeting of the Board was held in New York in August, 1860, and the *sixth* will be held in Boston in August, 1861.

The annual meetings are made occasions of great festivities; some pleasant tour being usually planned after the adjournment of each meeting. The members are generally accompanied by their ladies; and a more social and happier gathering than the Board of Music Trade is not to be found.

Music of Trinity Church, New York.

THE ORGAN

WAS built in 1846, by Henry Erben of this city, at a cost of about \$10,000, from a specification prepared by Dr. Hodges, organist of the church at that time. The organ has 43 stops. The diapasons are on a very large scale, giving a 16 ft. tone on each manual. The pedals contain two stops—16 and 32 feet. There are 8 reed stops, including a 16 feet trumpet, and 16 feet serpent. The swell organ is one of extraordinary power, and is enclosed in a triple swell box. The choir organ is separate from the main instrument, and is seen in front of the organ gallery—the action works passing under the organist's feet. The organ presents a majestic front, its highest point being 60 feet above the pavement of the church.

THE CHOIR.

Until within two years the singers occupied the usual place—the organ loft. On Easter Sunday, 1859, the choir occupied the chancel—a distance of 150 feet from the organ. This is considered a move in the right direction, and is no innovation but strictly in accordance with ancient usage. This change was brought about through the instrumentality of Mr. Cutler, the present organist, with the sanction of the clergy.

The service here is what is termed "Cathedral" or "Choral Service," that is, the clergy *intone* the prayers, and the *Amens* and all other responses are by the choir and the people in full harmony. This is the only church in this country where the English cathedral service is presented in its integrity, although an approximation to it is attempted at the Church of the Holy Communion (Dr. Muhlenberg's), Sixth av. c W. 20th st., and at the Church of the Advent, Boston.

The choir is composed of male voices exclusively. The parts usually sung by females are here sustained by boys. These boys are most carefully selected, with reference to musical aptitude and refinement of character, and belong to the higher walks of life. Their musical training is of the most thorough description. Daily they are practised at the chorister's music room in the most intricate vocal exercises, as well as in the classical works of Handel and the cathedral composers; any thing, however, which resembles in style the modern Italian is carefully avoided. These boys are trained to read the most difficult music at sight, even before they attain the age of thirteen.

Their voices are, with the exception of the altos, purely soprano, reaching to C in *alt* without difficulty. The tenor and bass parts are sung as usual by men. The full choir consists of 16 boys and 6 men—divided into two distinct choirs called *Decani* and *Cantoris*, making what is called an "Antiphonal Choir." The whole under the direction of Mr. Henry Stephen Cutler, the organist of the church. Dr. Hodges, Mr. Cutler's predecessor, has retired from church duties on account of bodily infirmities, and resides at Garrison's on the North River.

The usages of this church are peculiarly English, the employment of boy-singers being new in this country. Female singers are never heard in the English cathedrals. The English chorister boys always wear the surplice, the same as the clergy. This is the case at Trinity.

Choir boys' salaries at Trinity range from \$50 to \$200 per annum.

As an instance of the results of the thorough musical training of the Trinity chorister boys, the case of young Robjohn may be mentioned. This young man entered Trinity choir at the age of 14, and so rapid was his progress that at the age of 16 he sung on various occasions the most difficult of Handel's solos at a distance of 150 feet from the accompanying instrument. At 17 years of age he was deemed by the organist capable of playing the entire service of Trinity, and this difficult task he has repeatedly performed. His voice having changed, he now has charge of a choir and plays the organ.

THE BELLS.

Trinity Church has a full set of bells—nine in number—ranging from D to D, with F sharp, C natural, and C sharp, and can be played on in two keys. They are arranged different, however, to the English bells, and can be played by one person. There are nine handles, with nine levers run over pulleys, so that the clappers are brought to the side of the bells.

On festive occasions (Christmas, New Year's, and Fourth of July), for several years past, Mr. James E. Ayliffe, the regularly appointed ringer, plays several airs, some of which are rather difficult of execution, such as "Auld Lang Syne," "Blue Bells of Scotland," "Brindisi, from Lucretia Borgia," "Airs from the Child of the Regiment," "God save the Queen," "Hail Columbia," &c. The ringing the changes on eight bells is considered a great achievement, but is always successfully done on these occasions by Mr. Ayliffe.

On Christmas, 1859 and 1860, a part of the public service at

Trinity Church, was the singing of a hymn by the choir and children of the Sunday School, accompanied by the organ, in which the chimes were appropriately and happily introduced. After each stanza had been sung, the bells repeated the music of the two last lines—the distant echoes of which were exceedingly impressive.

Some of the bells in Trinity Church were made in England, in 1790. Nine are now considered a full set. Ancient peals did not, however, exceed five in number. In 1430 a sixth bell was added to the peal of five in one of the English churches, and was accounted "the best ring of bells for harmony and sweetness in Britain." Upon all festive occasions in England the church bells are chimed.

Trinity Chapel, in W. 25th street, has a chime of bells, three in number—A, C sharp, and E.

Christ Church, Boston, has a chime of eight bells, presented to that church "by a number of persons" in 1744. One of them has the motto, "We are the first ring of bells cast for the British Empire in North America." Another is, "Since generosity has opened our mouths, our tongues shall ring aloud its praise."

MUSIC SOCIETIES.

AMERICAN MUSICAL FUND SOCIETY, NEW YORK.

THIS is strictly a beneficial society, composed of musicians who play or teach some instrument as a principal means of a livelihood. To become a member an admission fee is required, varying according to the ratio of age, viz.: from 21 to 35 years \$10, above 35 years \$1 extra for each year—none being admitted, however, who are more than 50 years of age. Every member is also required to pay \$8 each year, quarterly in advance. In case of sickness the sum of \$5 per week is appropriated to the sick member—"not as a charity but as a right." Any member having regularly contributed to the funds of the Society for fifteen consecutive years, on his becoming incapacitated by age, accident, or infirmity, to follow his profession, is entitled to receive an annuity for life, the amount to be fixed according to the exigences of the case—not to exceed, however, \$250 per annum. Upon the death of a qualified member an appropriation of \$50 is made for the purpose of defraying the funeral expenses. Whenever a member of five years' standing

dies and leaves a widow, or widow and children, the Board of Directors grant such weekly allowance as the facts may warrant—not exceeding, however, \$2 per week for the widow, and \$1 for each child under 12 years of age. The Board of Directors also assume the guardianship of all orphan children of deceased members, superintending their education, and, when sufficiently old, securing for them suitable places in which they can earn their own subsistence at some respectable trade or profession. A laudable, a noble institution, indeed! one which every true musician should appreciate and foster.

Origin of the A. M. F. S.—The important advantages of forming a society for the purpose of creating a fund for the benefit of the profession, who were just as liable to sickness and misfortune as other people, were warmly and frequently discussed by the public journals of the day, prior to the autumn of 1848. In October of that year a meeting of the German musicians was called together by Mr. D. Schaad, at the suggestion of Mr. Geo. Schneider. Several meetings took place at No. 26 Delancey street, at which a constitution was framed. A public call was then made for all musicians to meet at the Apollo saloon in Broadway, on Saturday, December 23d, 1848. This call brought together musicians of all countries—Germans, English, Americans, French, and Italians. Mr. Anthony Reiff was called to the chair, and Mr. D. Schaad acted as secretary. At the preliminary meetings it had been designed to make the Society exclusively German, but at this meeting the resolution “That the language of the Society should be German,” was lost by an overwhelming majority, *although of those present two-thirds were Germans*. It was, however, determined that the constitution which the Society might adopt, should be printed in both the English and German languages.

On February 16th, 1849, the constitution, nearly in its present form, having been revised by a competent committee, was adopted. This committee consisted of Henry C. Watson, Henry C. Timm, D. G. Etienne, M. Rapetti, Thos. Dodworth, and Anthony Reiff. At this meeting the first officers of the Society were elected by ballot, viz.:

President, Henry A. Coit. First Vice President, George Loder; second Vice President, Anthony Reiff. Trustees—Ogden Haggerty, John H. Austen, and Julius Metz. Directors—Henry C. Timm, John A. Kyle, D. G. Etienne, Daniel Walker, Geo DeLuce, Philip Ernst, Alfred Boucher, Charles Jacoby, H. B. Dodworth, George Schneider, A. Bagnoli, and J. Windmuller. Treasurer—Wm. Scharfenberg. Secretary—John C. Scherpf.

A charter for the Society was obtained in April, 1849.

The number who participated in the election was over one hundred; several of these, however, withdrew unconditionally, a part of whom joined another society* established about the same time, leaving sixty-two actual members only; but the number has increased every year to the present time, when the last report (1859-60) announces 277 "actual members," 4 "life members," and 16 "honorary members." By the annual report it appears that the assets of the funds of the Society amount to \$19,556 93, most of which is deposited in Savings Banks of the city, and loaned out at 7 per cent. interest.

The election of officers, which took place on the 15th of February last (who assume their respective positions on the 16th of May of the present year), resulted thus:

THE PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY, OF NEW YORK.

Its object—the cultivation and performance of Instrumental Music. Its members consist of Actual, Professional, Associate, Subscribing, and Honorary. Each *Actual* member is required to be a professor of music, and an efficient performer on some instrument, and to pay, when elected, an initiation fee of \$10, and an annual tax of \$8. *Professional* members must be professors of music, and are entitled to admission to the public rehearsals and regular concerts of the Society, on the payment of \$3 a year. *Associate* members have the same privileges as the Professional members, on the payment of \$5 a year. *Subscribing* members are entitled to three tickets to each regular concert, on the payment of \$10 a year. *Honorary* members—a title conferred on eminent artists by a unanimous vote of the Actual members—are entitled to admission to all the rehearsals and concerts.

*The "New York Musical Mutual Protection Society," which, however, united amicably with the "American Musical Fund Society," in 1860—thus adding to the latter more than one hundred and thirty members, and \$4,363 90 to its funds.

The Board of Directors, composed of the eleven officers of the Society chosen annually in May, select from the Actual members at least sixty-six, who constitute the *regular orchestra* for the season.

Four or five concerts and eight or ten rehearsals are given each year—from November to April.

Soon after the last regular concert of each season, the Board of Directors are required to divide among the members of the regular orchestra all the funds remaining in the hands of the Treasurer.

This Society has been in existence nineteen years, having been organized in September, 1842. Its organization grew out of the earnest zeal and indefatigable exertions of a small number of the profession; among whom may be mentioned the names of U. C. Hill, D. Walker, and others. The Board of Officers for 1844, consisted of U. C. Hill, pres't; Geo. Loder, v. pres't; Wm. C. Scharfenberg, sec'y; A. Dodworth, treas'r; James L. Ensign, libr'n; A. Boucher and H. C. Timm, assistants. In 1844 the number of Actual members was 63. In 1860, the number was 1670—distributed thus:—Actual Members (the orchestra), 80; Non-performing, 17; Honorary Members, 23; Associate Members, 1264; Professional Members, 250; Subscribing Members, 36.

NEW YORK HARMONIC SOCIETY.

Instituted September, 1852; Incorporated April, 1857.

Soon after the breaking up of a society with a similar name to the one named above, several of the members who were deeply interested in the existence of such an institution, believing that by the proper effort a society might be organized and sustained, took subscription papers and obtained the names of several gentlemen for the purpose. The first preliminary meeting was held in the early part of August, 1852, at the house of one of the gentlemen signing the call, at which a committee was appointed to call another, and present a plan of operations. On Monday evening, August 23, 1852, the committee called a meeting of those interested at Constitutional Hall, 650 Broadway, and submitted their report, which, after being fully discussed, was received, and a resolution adopted to proceed to the organization of a society upon the principles therein laid down, viz.: that "it must be, in every respect, self-sustaining in its character, and that the members must look to themselves and not to the public to pay their expenses."

On Monday evening, August 30, the Constitution was adopted, and on the succeeding Monday evening, September 6, the first Board of Officers was elected, viz.: Isaac M. Phyfe, pres't; L. B. Wyman, 1st v. pres't; J. Baylea, 2d v. pres't; J. A. Emons, treas'r; J. H. Aikman, sec'y; A. W. Hoffman, cor. sec'y; Geo. F. Bristow, cond'r; W. Wild, libr'n; W. B. Taylor, A. B. Stewart, and J. W. Evans, standing committee.

The Society has continued from that time to the present to meet once every week for rehearsals—usually on Monday even-

ings—George F. Bristow acting as its conductor during the whole time, with the exception of five months, when Mr. Bergmann officiated. The rehearsals, since 1855, have been held at Dodworth's Hall, 806 Broadway, and from four to six public performances have been given each year since its organization. It has about 300 members, but the severe drills necessary to make good singers competent to the highest style of music, limit the number of active members. The Society has done much, and it is noted and popular for its generous readiness to sing for benevolent purposes.

For several years, male members paid \$3 initiation fee, and \$4 each year, but during a year or two past the Society has been divided into two classes—*Corporate* and *Associate*. The Corporate Members are limited to 100, and must be all male vocal performers, who each pay \$10 annually. The dues of the Associate Members, who have the privilege of attending all the rehearsals and concerts, are not to exceed those of the Corporate Members.

The election of officers is held annually on the first Monday in September. The officers for 1860–61, are

THE "MENDELSSOHN UNION" SOCIETY, NEW YORK.

This Society was organized about eight years since. Its originators were also members of the New York "Madrigal Club," which had been meeting for practice once each week during the previous year, Mr. G. W. Morgan being its conductor. The Mendelssohn Union started with high hopes and expectations, which it is believed have been partially realized. It commenced with the understanding that new Oratorios and music of a high order only were to be performed; and, to improve its own members, all solos, etc., were to be executed by those belonging to the Society. Public performances were to be given from time to time for the benefit and pleasure of its own members—at which their friends were to be invited. This plan has been partially departed from in a few instances, and tickets have been sold. Gentlemen performing members at first paid \$10, and non-performing members \$5, each year.

The Society has now about 100 active members, and meets every week for rehearsal at the lecture room of the Reformed Dutch Church on W. 23d st., between Sixth and Seventh avenues.

THE ALPINE MUSICAL ASSOCIATION OF NEW YORK.

This Society was organized August 20, 1858. Its objects in its constitution, are declared to be the "cultivation of our musical powers, the acquisition of a more thorough knowledge of music, and the promotion of social intercourse." Its membership is about 175. Public performances are occasionally given. Rehearsal every Thursday evening at No. 27 Sixth avenue, opposite Amity street.

NATIONAL MUSICAL INSTITUTE, AT NEW YORK.

This is the name of a Society which meets for practice once every week, on Thursday evenings, at its own hall, 765 Broadway, near Eighth street. It was organized in 1859, and is managed by a Board of Directors. Its constitution says—"This Institute has been organized for the purpose of imparting to its patrons a thorough knowledge of the elementary branches of music—introducing at a trifling cost the compositions of the Great Masters, and the fostering of native talent and productions, thus imbuing the public with a taste for the highest standard of musical ability."

It occasionally gives public performances. The Board for 1860-61, are,

Among the several musical societies which have, from time to time, sprung up in New York, flourished for a season and then been disbanded, may be mentioned the following:—

THE EUTERPEAN SOCIETY.

This Society, consisting of gentlemen amateurs who were competent to play some instrument, was organized in 1798, and incorporated subsequently by the Legislature of the State. It met for rehearsal once each week from October to May. The Society never designed to give *public* concerts, yet occasionally soirees were given for the pleasure of the members' families and intimate friends. The last one of each season was generally connected with a ball. After being in existence nearly sixty years, it was dissolved, and its property sold for the benefit of the members. Its last place of meeting was at the Mercer House, corner of Broome and Mercer streets, where a room was rented for the purpose for several years. The last Board of Officers were

THE NEW YORK SACRED MUSIC SOCIETY,

Which, after having been in successful operation from 20 to 25 years, was disbanded in 1850, much to the regret of the musical community. It is generally acknowledged that this Society, during its organization, did much toward the cultivation of sacred music of a high order, the effects of which are seen at the present day. Among its conductors, at various periods, were Samuel Dyer, John Cole, Samuel Earle, and U. C. Hill; the latter officiating in that capacity about 15 years.

THE NEW YORK HANDEL AND HAYDN SOCIETY

Was an association that at one time had considerable notoriety and a large number of worthy members. Mr. James Demarest was its last conductor. When it was dissolved some of those who had belonged to it, and other persons, formed a new society, which they named the

NEW YORK HANDEL AND HAYDN UNION SOCIETY.

This Society was organized on the 11th of November, 1835, by electing C. H. Roach, pres't; A. B. Rumsey, v. pres't; Chas. Dingley, cor. sec'y; Norwood Bowne, rec. sec'y; Thos. P. Devoe, treas'r; Wm. H. Williams, libr'n; Wm. J. Edson, cond'r. This was, for about three years, a very flourishing and useful organization, and then, like its predecessors, it faded away.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY, OF BROOKLYN,

Is an association of gentlemen—not necessarily performers—who select every year from their own number a Board of Directors, and this Board arrange for four or five public concerts, and ten or twelve rehearsals. The performers are the best that can be procured, and are liberally paid for their services. It will be perceived that it is differently managed from the New York Philharmonic. The concerts and rehearsals are given in the Brooklyn Academy of Music, located on Montague street, between Court and Clinton streets.

HANDEL AND HAYDN SOCIETY, OF BOSTON.

Wherever the English language is spoken the name of the Boston Handel and Haydn Society is familiar, and had we space it could be profitably devoted to giving details of its operations since its organization in 1815.

This Society, as its act of incorporation declares, was originally intended to be devoted to the cultivation of sacred music, and this, it is believed, has still been its purpose. It is probably the most efficient organization of its kind in the country.

"When this Society was first organized and for a long period of years thereafter," says the report of the Secretary last year, "it was the only channel through which the great works of the greatest composers [Handel, Haydn, and others], that have ever lived, could be conveyed to the ears of the public; and the consequence was that it met with very considerable success, pecuniarily, in its public performances, and enjoyed a degree of popularity unexampled in the history of any similar association, here or elsewhere. Its concerts were thronged with the *élite* of the city; and there it was that the great sacred compositions referred to above, were heard for the first time by a large majority of those who frequented them. To this fact may be attributed, in no small degree, the high state of musical culture and appreciation which has always characterized our community."

This Society is the oldest one of its kind in the world. There was one in Germany organized in 1812, but it was dissolved during the year 1860.

There have been in Boston for many years, numerous music societies of more or less importance. At various times there have been the Philharmonic, the Mendelssohn, the Orpheus, and others; but not having been furnished in season with the necessary facts, we are not able to give, in the present edition, detailed information respecting them.

In Philadelphia there have existed, for many years, a "Handel and Haydn Society," and another called the "Musical Fund Society;" and there are other musical associations of established reputation, but at present our information from them is not sufficiently full and exact.

In Baltimore, Cincinnati, and other large cities and towns possessing musical ability and taste, there are numerous flourishing societies. Throughout the State of New York and the New England States, towns and even villages of a thousand inhabitants have musical societies, but the work of obtaining the necessary facts connected with their operations involves time and immense labor, and we are obliged to defer giving them in this edition. Will parties interested please favor us with the facts?

THE GERMAN SINGING SOCIETIES.—These Societies are organized in the principal cities of the Union—New York alone having about 30 of them. Once every year they assemble at some city fixed upon the previous year, where they hold their grand "Saengerfest." Last year the festival was held at Buffalo, N. Y.; this year, in June, the festival will be held in New York City.

We have made laborious efforts to obtain the names of the officers of each of these societies, but the gentlemen to whom we applied could, probably, see no advantage in giving their own names, or, perhaps, were jealous of giving those of other persons; and after being baffled many times we have postponed our inquiries, but hope, before our next edition is issued, to find more accommodating members of these societies than those whom thus far it has been our fortune to meet.

MUSIC HALLS.—There are in most large American cities first class Music Halls, mainly devoted to the production of the highest species of musical composition.

The Academy of Music in New York, on E. 14th street corner of Irving place, is a building capable of accommodating

four or five thousand auditors. It is occupied about eight months of the year by Italian Opera Companies. The New York Philharmonic Society gives its concerts and rehearsals in this house. Oratorios and lectures are also given here. It is owned by an association of gentlemen, and is managed by a Board of Directors.

The Brooklyn Academy of Music, erected during 1860, is a similar building, accommodating about as many people, and is designed to accomplish the same object as the New York Academy of Music. It is also owned and managed in a similar manner. It is located on Montague, between Court and Clinton streets.

There is an Academy of Music in Philadelphia, and another, we believe, in Boston; each having a similar object to accomplish to the one in New York.

In Philadelphia there are also two Music Halls—one called the Hall of the Musical Fund Society, the other the Handel and Haydn Society Hall; the latter is located at No. 533 N. 8th street.

In Cincinnati, Pike's Opera House is the name given to one of the finest architectural ornaments of that city, situated on Fourth street. It has a large and splendid auditorium specially designed and used for operas, concerts, lectures, etc.
