The question is how many Joerdens were there? Is John F. M. really John Frederick Madias? This would account for two other names but not James, Adolph, George, and Charles. They all seem to live at the same addresses but no city directory has more than one name listed per year. Lena is listed as the widow of Charles right after John dies, yet she is buried with John in the same plot with no other Joerdens. Is Lena short for Caroline since they have the same age, address, and son Harry born in 1871? Most of the entries above are from Brooklyn and New York City directories. There are variations in the spelling which I have left as they are shown. "Joerdens" should be correct as that is what's on the grave stone.

**Jordens & Martens:** Unrelated music store on Broadway from about 1867 to 1874 and owned by Gerhard Jordens This was followed by a Jordens Bros. owned by Peter & Martin Jordens.
